Siempre Unidos is growing in Honduras and the U.S.!

In Honduras, we saw a significant growth in the number of patients served. All of our newly diagnosed HIV+ clients were between the ages of 15 and 25, which is a shift we have seen in recent years. Almost all were gay men or transgender women.

In the U.S., we welcomed two new board members who arrived just in time to help plan programs uniquely tailored to our prioritized groups, i.e. youth, gay men, transgender women, members of the Garifuna (Afro-Caribbean) community, commercial sex workers, and people living in extreme poverty. We also focused on succession planning and have approved an ambitious budget for 2024 that includes a position for someone to work with, learn from, and eventually succeed Pascual.

You have been unwavering in your generous giving. Thank you for ensuring our growth and success in treating and advocating for people living with HIV. We look forward to expanding with a focus on young people in the year to come and - with your help- establishing targeted prevention and outreach programs focused on this vulnerable population.

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# **CLINIC-BASED SERVICES**

#### CDC Representatives Visit to Learn about Siempre Unidos' Success

In July 2023, Siempre Unidos hosted an official visit from representatives of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), its Central American partners, and the HIV branch of the Honduras Ministry of Health. In addition to

offering technical support to Honduran clinics, the visitors wanted to understand how Siempre Unidos patients have exceeded global standards by 93% of them maintaining non-detectable viral loads, meaning zero chance of infecting others.

The method for success is not so mysterious. As Pascual wrote, "They were pleasantly impressed by the holistic care provided to patients of Siempre Unidos, which includes not only the clinical aspect but also mental health, and the nutritional support...The visit also highlighted that we are the only clinics that have a home visit component in Honduras."



# **ADVOCACY**

## Respect and Dignity Lead to Empowerment

In a society where people living with HIV suffer isolation and stigma, Siempre Unidos treats everyone with respect, dignity, and warmth. This is an act of advocacy and empowerment for people who do not feel loved or valued in other contexts.

Miguel and Carlos (pseudonyms) are a young couple who grew up in a small, conservative Honduran city. When one of them received a positive HIV result at our clinic, we encouraged him to bring his boyfriend in for testing. They were both enrolled in anti-retroviral treatment and couple's

counseling. As Pascual wrote, "This is a success story! Their viral loads are non-detectable and they are a committed couple."

In addition to advocating for the rights and dignity of our patients through therapy, self-support groups, and education, Siempre Unidos sponsored parades and celebrations of Garifuna Heritage, LGBTQ+ pride, commercial sex workers, and World AIDS Day.

# **OUTREACH**

#### Let Communities Lead

The United Nations program on AIDS 2023 theme was "Let communities lead," a recognition that communities' leadership roles are vital to ending AIDS.

Since its founding as one of Honduras' first HIV/AIDS treatment clinics, Siempre Unidos community partners have inspired and driven our programs. Early in our two decades of service, we aligned ourselves with leaders in the LGBTQ+ and commercial sex worker communities. For example, with their direction, Siempre Unidos shaped its HIV prevention education messages to meet their unique needs in locations that suited them.

By building on community leadership and inspiring trust, Siempre Unidos held 28 day-long and 73 half-day health fairs that included free medical consultations and HIV education, testing, and counseling as well as sessions on topics like mental health, breast cancer, and reproductive health. Over 7,000 visits were made and over 1,600 people received HIV testing at the events for people who are Garifuna (Afro-Caribbean) and/or living in the unincorporated riverbank settlements or municipal dump.




# SPECIAL FEATURE

### Siempre Unidos Patients by the Numbers and Year

Siempre Unidos' net year-end patient census grew by 11% between 2020 and 2023 from 479 to 531, respectively. Each year, we actually served more HIV+ clients (556 total in 2023) but lost others to migration out of Honduras, violence, and illness, so these figures represent only net gain. We estimate that each HIV+ patient brings an additional 3 family members into general medical and social care at Siempre Unidos, so 531 active clients brought an additional 1,668 people into care in 2023.

The number of people identifying as gay, bisexual, and/or transgender grew by 35%; the number of patients identifying as heterosexual women grew by 12%; the number of male heterosexuals declined by 3%. Gay and transgender rights groups and gay men referred their friends to Siempre Unidos because of our commitment to confidentiality, stigma abatement, and advocacy. The number of women increased because of our focus on educating and testing women and girls living in severe poverty and harsh conditions like the dump.




humanities at a Sonoma County high school after appointments at schools in Massachusetts, Honduras, and Costa Rica.

Our two-day meeting focused on several important topics including succession planning for Pascual. Pascual has been the co-founder and exemplary leader of Siempre Unidos for 24 years and wishes to slowly step back over the next several years. The board wants to find and hire a new potential successor in 2024 who can work with and learn from Pascual to be well prepared to follow him, a difficult task given Pascual's knowledge, commitment, and compassion. We also discussed future goals from a Honduran perspective. These included an emphasis on working and educating young people about HIV prevention.



## **FINANCIALS**





In 2023, Siempre Unidos's cash-basis income totaled \$443,426 and \$36,245 was released for designated spending. Expenses totaled \$479,671.
